Communication for a Successful Growing Season

Good communication is one of the most important tools we have as we head into another growing season. Staying in touch and planning ahead with your local agronomist can go a long way toward reducing mistakes in the field and keeping everything running smoothly.

Please make sure we have your most up-to-date field information, including maps, fertilizer recommendations, and chemical plans. If there have been any changes, new fields, updated chemical recommendations, or a switch in seed traits, let your agronomist know as soon as possible so we can adjust your plans accordingly.

To help us serve you best, we ask for at least one to two days' notice for spreading and spraying applications. This advance notice allows us to plan our schedule at the co-op, use our equipment efficiently, and cover more acres in a day while still providing quality service.

Scouting and Keeping Fields Clean

We're here to help you keep your fields clean of weeds, insects, and diseases with timely applications and scouting support. Starting with a good pre-emerge (PRE) herbicide on corn and soybeans is a great way to "start clean and stay clean." Products containing metolachlor or acetochlor provide residual control and help prevent weeds from emerging in the first place.

A good rule of thumb is to plan your post-emerge (POST) spray about 21–28 days after your PRE application. Spraying based on timing rather than waiting until you see weeds is one of the best ways to keep fields clean all season long.

What Are Acetochlor and Metolachlor?

Acetochlor and metolachlor are Group 15 residual herbicides that work by inhibiting seedling shoot growth as weeds germinate. They create a barrier in the top layer of soil, controlling many small-seeded annual grasses and certain broadleaf weeds when they emerge. These products are often applied early in the season or in combination with a post-emerge herbicide program.

Did You Know? Weed Growth Facts


Understanding how fast problem weeds can grow shows why timely applications matter so much.

Waterhemp can grow roughly 1 to 1.25 inches per day under good conditions and may reach 4 inches in less than a week. That rapid growth makes staying ahead of it with residual and follow-up sprays especially important.

Common ragweed germinates quickly in warm, moist soil from spring into early summer, and a single plant can produce tens of thousands of seeds, often in the 30,000 to 60,000 range, many of which can remain viable in the soil for decades.

Staying proactive with planning, scouting, and timely herbicide applications will give you the best chance at clean fields and strong yields.

Fungicide Planning for 2026

Last season brought very heavy disease pressure across our area, and many of us were surprised by how aggressive southern rust became in some fields, at times causing more concern than the headline disease, tar spot. Southern rust typically does not overwinter in our cold Minnesota climate and must blow in each year, while tar spot can overwinter in corn residue and remain a concern for multiple seasons even with crop rotation.

Two of the most important tools we have to manage diseases are variety selection and fungicide applications.


Choosing hybrids and varieties with strong disease scores is a critical first step, but even the best genetics can still see infection under the right conditions. The fungicide marketplace is wide, with many excellent products that differ in how well they protect against specific diseases, which is why it's important to look at where your seed genetics may be more vulnerable, your past field history, and which diseases you want to stay ahead of

when selecting a product.

When it comes to fungicides, timing is key for both corn and soybeans. Whether you plan to apply by airplane, helicopter, drone, or ground rig, having a plan in place early makes a big difference. Getting fields scouted and getting your name on the application list ahead of time greatly improves your chances of catching diseases before they cut into yield.

No matter what brand of seed you plant, where you farm, or what your recent disease history has been, there is always some level of disease risk in every season. All of us at Hutchinson Co-op are here to help you evaluate that risk, choose the right fungicide, and build a plan that fits your fields and your operation. Wishing you a safe, healthy, and successful 2026 growing season!

New Seed Treater Installed

We're thrilled to announce the installation of our new state-of-the-art seed treating system, now up and running in our new Agronomy building. This upgraded automated KSI continuous-flow treater allows us to treat soybeans faster, more efficiently, and in a heated facility—ensuring even, high-quality coverage every time.

Another big improvement: growers can now load their bulk soybeans indoors, making the process smoother and more convenient no matter the weather. We're excited to begin using this new system and look forward to treating your soybeans soon!

Product Spotlight: Stride Bio

Looking to improve seed germination and early vigor this spring? Stride Bio might be exactly what you need. It's a biological and nutritional complex designed to strengthen root growth and boost early season plant health.

Used as a replacement for talc or graphite, Stride Bio comes in an 8-pound shaker or 35-pound pail. It includes six essential micronutrients, a biological complex, and Yield Burst Technology that gives seeds a strong start and helps mitigate early season stress.

Field trials around Hutchinson have shown a 4–6 bushel advantage on corn when using Stride Bio in place of traditional talc. It's suitable for corn, soybeans, wheat, and alfalfa—so it's a great option for nearly every rotation. When you stop in for your seed or chemical this spring, ask your agronomist about Stride Bio. We'll have the 8-pound shakers in stock.

been installed to replace the original, well-worn unit, and we've updated our application equipment with a newer, more efficient machine at our Arlington location.

Best of all, we're fully staffed with a great team that's ready to get the job done. We're excited for the season ahead and ready to help you in any way we can.

The Energy Department would like to extend a heartfelt congratulations to Dwight Wiechman on his retirement. Dwight has served Hutch Co-op as a delivery driver and summer tender driver for the past four years, following many years of truck driving in his career. He has been a dependable employee with a strong work ethic, and we wish him all the best as he begins this next chapter. Enjoy retirement, Dwight, and thank you for your dedication and service!

As we wrap up another heating season, please remember to check your tanks, especially if you have contract gallons remaining. Contracts will expire on April 25th, so now is the time to get those tanks filled. Any unused contract gallons after April 25th will not roll over into next year but will instead be credited back to your account for use on any Hutchinson Co-op purchase.

For our call-in propane customers, we ask that you contact us when your tank is between 20–30%. This helps us route deliveries efficiently and serve you in a timely manner. For summer fills, please call when your tank is at 45–50% or below. Summer fills are a great opportunity to take advantage of typically lower propane prices, but we still need to meet the minimum drop of 150 gallons on 320-gallon tanks and larger.

We strongly encourage all customers to consider our Budget Plan or to set up a charge account. If you already use one of these options, we invite you to take the next step and enroll in our Regular Scheduled Delivery (RSD/Keep Full) program. This allows us to plan routes more efficiently, reduces out-of-gas and same-day delivery calls, and can help you avoid those extra fees. In turn, our improved efficiency helps us return more value to members through patronage.

We also recommend that customers add a tank monitor. For our RSD customers, monitors are complimentary, and we are working toward having them installed on all RSD tanks. For Will Call (call-in) customers, monitors can be rented for \$51 per year. An email address is required so you can conveniently view your tank level from home. These monitors plug directly into your tank gauge and use cellular data to report your tank percentage.

This summer, our team will be out conducting required leak checks on all systems. Our goal is to have leak checks completed on 100% of our customers on a rolling five-year schedule. During these visits, we will also inspect regulator

dates and replace first-stage regulators on leased tanks as needed. If we find an expired regulator on a customer-owned tank or a second-stage regulator on the building, we will contact you for approval before replacing them. Regulators must be replaced every 20–25 years to stay compliant and up to code.

As we move into planting season, now is a great time to fill your fuel tanks and keep a close eye on levels. Keeping tanks full helps us operate more efficiently and reduces the chances of same-day emergencies or run-outs, which in turn helps you keep equipment running and get your crops in on schedule.

Our fuels are Cenex Premium products: Ruby Fieldmaster (dyed) and Roadmaster. These fuels include an additive and detergent package with a lubricity improver, cetane booster, injector cleaner, demulsifier, and corrosion inhibitor, all working together to support engine performance, longevity, and smoother operation.

Looking ahead, many are asking about contracting fuel for fall. At this time, the market is not particularly favorable, but we will continue to watch it closely. When fall pricing begins to look more attractive, we will let you know so you can consider your contracting options.

If you have any questions about fuels, propane, purchasing options, or delivery programs, please reach out. We in the Energy Department truly appreciate your business and look forward to serving you in the year ahead.

Bins full at home? Here's why to haul to Hutch Co-op.

If your bins are full and you're wondering what to do next, Hutchinson Co-op offers a free DP storage program throughout the summer for your grain. It's a great way to move grain off the farm while keeping your marketing options open.

Grain contract options

To help you market grain the way that works best for your operation, Hutch Co-op offers several contract choices:

- Cash contracts
- Basis contracts
- HTA (Hedge-to-Arrive) contracts
- And coming soon: a Seasonal Average Contract to help spread out pricing risk over time

Bulk ingredient delivery schedule

Hutch Co-op delivers bulk ingredients on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, with at least 48 hours' notice so we can properly prepare your ration. If you'd like to order complete feed, please plan for one week of advance notice.

When should I be contracting grain?

You can contract grain anytime, but many growers look to price during typical seasonal price strength, often February through April for corn, and January through June for soybeans. It's always a good idea to stay in regular communication with your Grain Merchandiser about markets, timing, and which contract tools fit your farm.

From all of us at Hutchinson Co-op, thank you for trusting us with your grain and feed needs this season.

Graham Cracker Crust

2 cups of graham crackers crumbs
7 Tbsp butter melted
1/3 cup of sugar
1/2 tsp vanilla extract
Pinch of sea salt

Lemon Cheesecake Filling

24 oz cream cheese soften (3x8 oz)
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 tsp vanilla extract
2 Tbsp lemon
1 Tbsp Lemon Zest
1/3 cup of powdered sugar
1/2 cup sour cream room temperature
1 cup heavy whipping cream, very cold

Blueberry Lemon Topping

2 cups of blueberries
1/2 cup sugar
1 1/2 Tbsp of cornstarch
1/4 cup water
Juice and Zest of one lemon

LEMON BLUEBERRY NO BAKE CHEESECAKE

Mix crumbs with melted butter, sugar, vanilla and a pinch of salt. Press firmly into a 9-inch spring foam pan. Freeze for 15 minutes.

Prepare the cheesecake filling:

- In a bowl, beat softened cream cheese and sugar until smooth.
- Add sour cream, vanilla, lemon juice, zest, and powdered sugar; beat until creamy.
- In a separate bowl, beat the chilled heavy cream until it forms stiff peaks.
- Carefully fold the whipped cream into the lemon cream cheese mixture until fully incorporated.

Assemble and chill:

- Spread the filling evenly over the chilled crust. Chill the cheesecake in the refrigerator for at least 8 hours or overnight until it's completely set.

Make the topping:

- Combine blueberries, sugar, cornstarch, water, lemon juice and zest in a saucepan. Simmer over medium-low heat for 7-10 minutes, stir ring until thickened. Cool, and chill

Before serving, top the cheesecake with the chilled blueberry lemon sauce


